The Meeting Of Our Lord & Saviour Jesus Christ in the Temple.

This feast, celebrated on February 2, is also known in the Orthodox Church as The Presentation of Christ in the Temple. Another name for the feast is The Meeting of our Lord. Roman Catholic and Protestant Christians call the feast, The Purification of the Holy Virgin. About 450 AD in Jerusalem, people began the custom of holding lighted candles during the Divine Liturgy of this feast day. Therefore, some churches in the West refer to this holy day as Candlemas. The Feast of the Presentation concludes the observances related to the Nativity of Christ, a period that opened on November 15 with the beginning of the Nativity fast. The hymns of the feast emphasize the incarnate God, the Lord Jesus Christ, meeting with His people, Israel, in the persons of the Prophet Simeon and the Prophetess Anna. In the Gospel of Luke 2:22-35, Mary and Joseph took the infant Christ to the Temple in Jerusalem. He was received in the arms of the elder Simeon, who then prayed, "Now let Thy servant depart in peace... for I have seen Thy salvation." This was one of the things that Mary "pondered in her heart": the fact that others recognized that her Son was the Messiah. All of us, like Simeon must 'take Christ in our arms' and depart in peace; not from the trials and tribulations of this life, which we must continue to live through and face with faith, love, courage and humility but instead to depart from the hold that sin, the passions and the world has on us. 




PREPARATORY SUNDAYS BEFORE GREAT LENT



"Let us flee the bragging of the Pharisee, and learn the humility of the Publican, while crying out unto the Savior with groanings: Be gracious unto us, O Thou Who alone dost readily forgive". Kontakion Tone 4

It seems a little hard to believe, but once again we are amongst the Sundays that precede and prepare us for Lent, the Great Fast. There is a palpable change in the atmosphere of the Divine Liturgies of each of these Sundays. Starting with the Pre-Triodion Sunday of Zacchaeus which reminds us to recognise Jesus for Who He Is, to come down from our tree of pride and self worship to meet Him, we are led first to the Publican and the Pharisee with its theme of humility and recognition of our sinful state. We are enjoined to adopt the humble, self-effacing prayer of the publican and shun the hard hearted, proud rigorism of the Pharisee. Moving on, we encounter the Prodigal Son and we see ourselves in him, lost in the ruins and sadness of our self will and sitting among the pigs. We rouse ourselves and get up to return home and find that our All-Merciful Father has run out to meet us, to put a fine robe upon our shoulders and prepare a feast in our honour! On the Sunday of the Last Judgement we are reminded that, as we proclaim in the Nicene Creed, Christ will indeed come again in Glory to judge the living and the dead. Will we be found worthy on that awesome day of inheriting the Kingdom by virtue of our true love for God and our neighbour or by our negligence and hardness of heart be burned up like so much petrified wood? Then at last, on Forgiveness Sunday, at which we recall the Expulsion of Adam and Eve from Paradise, we are reminded that our dire inheritance is a broken communion with God, and thereby with each other. We take a step towards restoring this communion in the beautiful Vespers service, at which the faithful embrace and ask, often with tears, mutual forgiveness for the sins committed by all of us towards each other. On the Monday after we begin The Great Fast. Good Strength! Father Mark



St Colman Bishop of Lindisfarne February 18

An Irish bishop of Lindisfarne, England, a disciple of St. Columba. He was born in Connaught, Ireland. At the Synod of Whitby Colman defended the Celtic ecclesiastical practices against St. Eilfrid and St. Agilbert. When King Oswy introduced the Roman rites, Colman refused to accept the decision and led a group of Irish and English monks to the Isle of Innishboffin, near Connaught. In time he moved the English monks to Mayo. Colman was praised by St. Bede.
