The Annunciation to The Most Holy Theotokos & Ever Virgin Mary: March 25th

On the Feast of the Annunciation, Orthodox Christians commemorate both the divine action of God, whereby He took on flesh from the Virgin for our salvation, and the human response, whereby Mary freely accepted the vocation offered to her. He elected to become man, and He desired to do this with the willing agreement of her whom He chose as His mother. Mary could have refused, for she was not a passive instrument, but an active participant with a free and positive part to play in God's plan for our salvation. Thus, when on this and other feasts the Orthodox Church honors the Theotokos, the Mother of God, it is not just because God chose her but also because she herself chose to follow His will. All of us are called in some way to this willing acceptance in our own lives, as God calls us each one to take up the cross of becoming who we were created to be. To become co-workers with God (1 Cor 3:9) in the building of His Kingdom.

Clergy of the Archdiocese Meet with Sayedna at Walsingham





ST JOHN CLIMACUS OF SINAI

"Fight to escape from your own cleverness. If you do, then you will find salvation and uprightness through Jesus Christ our Lord." John Climacus,



On the Fourth Sunday of Lent, the Orthodox Remember St John Climacus of Sinai, the Seventh Century author of that great spiritual classic, 'The Ladder of Divine Ascent'. This thirty chapter treatise on spiritual warfare covers the many vices which beset each of us to a greater or lesser extent, alongside their corresponding virtues. Originally written for monastics, it requires handling with respect and care and should not be treated lightly, like a modern era 'self-help' book. It is sobering to discover upon opening its pages that human nature has apparently not changed one iota since the work was originally written, for all our self absorbed, modern talk of 'evolution' and 'progress'. Thirteen hundred years after 'The Ladder' was produced, its vivid and subtle analysis of our human brokenness and folly is deeply affecting. So much wisdom and treasure is contained within its pages that it has become perhaps the primary Orthodox spiritual classic and thus it is best read with the guidance of a spiritual father, a priest or someone with pastoral responsibility for the lay reader. Perhaps the overarching theme is that of the great struggle to which we must set ourselves. As with Mary, the Mother of God and her willing acceptance of the extraordinary vocation to which she was called; we too must agree to this struggle, to 'turn up', to consent to do our part and agree to participate in God's saving action in our lives. Mere intellectual 'agreement' with our religion is insufficient. We must take part, we must engage mind, body and soul, we must assent. God respects our freedom, it is part of His image within us. If we take up arms in this fight, God will help us! Or, we can choose to stay as we are....



A Relic of St Jacob of Hamatoura is Gifted to the Parish.

At the event in Walsingham we were presented with a relic of St Jacob of Hamatoura (a monastery in Lebanon). Fr Michel Touma of St George Antiochian Cathedra, London, presented the relic, along with a letter of authentication from the Abbot of the Hamatoura Monastery. St Jacob was a 15th Century monastic, cruelly persecuted, tortured and killed for his faith by Mamluk soldiers who attempted without success to convert him to Islam. Our dear friend George Iouannou is helping to mount the relic on an icon of the saint, which will be hung in the church for all to venerate. It is such a blessing to receive a holy relic for our parish. Holy St Jacob, pray to God for us!
