Our Parish loses a friend

Archimandrite Athanasius, who has lived in this area for about ten years and has been a good friend of this parish, sadly died - but appropriately on the feast of St Elias, 20 July. He had had cancer for some three years, but accepted it, and never seemed to be overcome by it. I was struck by his inner peace and continuing joy.

Born William Ledwich to a Church of Ireland clergyman and his wife, after studies at St Chad's College, Durham and Trinity College Dublin, he was ordained in the Anglican Church, serving in parishes in Lancashire and Northumberland and at Hereford Cathedral.

By the early 1980s he had become disenchanted with the Anglican way, which seemed to him to be increasingly parting from its own traditions and its earlier commitment to the Fathers. In 1984 it came to a head: the new Bishop of Durham proclaimed heretical views about our basic beliefs about Christ, and was not disciplined. William wrote a little book, *The Durham Affair*, very critical of the Anglican position, left under that 'cloud' of plain-speaking, and was received into the Orthodox Church.

Soon he was ordained and founded the parish at Rugby, and then an Orthodox school at Edgbaston, Birmingham.

A member of a religious order even as an Anglican, the monastic life beckoned him and after a period on the Holy Mountain he was tonsured. But he felt he was called to found a monastery in England, and returned home.

So he came to Colchester, where he could be near the Monastery of St John the Baptist and worship there. Nobody came to join him, so he founded a *Hermitage* on the Shotley Peninsula, caring also (rather unwillingly, it must be said) for Ipswich Greek parish.

Some two years ago he moved to Lawford near Manningtree, but sadly that coincided with the onset of cancer. With this he battled without any capitulation, and became an example to all. His faith in Christ and his contentment were impressive. A number of people kept their eye on him, and this was evidence of the love he inspired. Occasionally he could be a rather hard man, and he did manage to upset some people. Yet his love for Christ and his care for people was evident. His foundation of *Orthodox Outlook*, and two periods as its editor, were part of that care, educating the faithful, encouraging them to holiness.

In his weakness he became unable to serve, but continued to attend the Liturgy at the Monastery until within a fortnight or so of his repose. And I and then Fr John Garnett had served in the Hermitage chapel. His last visit to St Helen's was on Holy Thursday, when he was able to read two of the Gospels.

His funeral, attended by four Bishops, was at the Monastery, and he was buried close to his Hermitage at Lawford. He will be much missed by many of us. Eternal memory! He surely continues to remember us as we do him.

The Saint from Antioch who came as Pastor to the English


St Theodore was born in Tarsus in Cilicia, south-east Turkey or Asia Minor, in the Church of Antioch. Over the years, via Antioch itself, Edessa, Constantinople, Athens, Rome, he migrated westwards, till becoming Archbishop of Canterbury in AD 669.

He was already 66 years old, but remained in post until his death in 690, having thoroughly organised the Church of the English.

He increased the number of bishops, organised synods on doctrinal and canonical matters, showed authority where necessary, taught the Faith to the people, organised the training of the clergy, negotiated peace between kings, was loved by all.

He is numbered to this day among the great Archbishops to lead the nation and to guide its rulers. His influence can still be seen in the organisation of the Anglican Church.

Knowledge of the Saint had been lost in his home area, but when Archbishop John arrived here in 2009 we told him about the Saint, and he chose St Theodore to be Patron of our Deanery. His feast



is 19 September, and we should remember this great man of Antioch with thanksgiving. We must ask his prayers for this Deanery of his Church, here in the land he made his home.

Universal Exaltation of the Precious & Life-giving Cross

Meditation on a Mountain

20th July, St Elias' Day.

The Prophet Elias (Elijah) prayed on mountains. That is why in Greece you will often see a little white Church high up on mountain-tops.

We decided to go up to the Liturgy on top of the hill, some 1150 metres above sea level. It was an adventurous ascent, with many hairpin bends. And it was wonderful to be up there.

Meanwhile, about 20 miles away, across the Bay of Actium, in Preveza Metropolitan Meletios was preaching a sermon about the miracles of St Elias.

Our little Church has one white dome shining in the sun, visible from miles away.

The view from there is unbelievable. You look down on the Ionian Sea, full of islands large and small.

The congregation, packed inside and standing outside, included uniformed officers and men of the Greek Army and Air Force.

The beauty of the Liturgy and the singing filled the small Church and echoed from the windows around the hilltops.

Praying up there, so high up, you feel that you are nearer heaven.

What spoiled our magical moment somewhat was the twisting torture of the descent - back to ground level again.

The Holy Theotokos (literally, 'Bearer of God') is at the centre of our Orthodox Faith. A widely loved icon of her is that of Vladimir - still in the Tretyakov Gallery in Moscow. Said to be originally by St Luke himself, it is very fine. Unusually, Christ is on her right arm. It was a gift from Constantinople to the Russians in the 12th century. We reproduce it here in honour of her Nativity or Birth, which we celebrate on 8 September, at the beginning of the Church year.

A Word from the Fathers

St Andrew of Crete (born in Damascus 660, a son of the Church of Antioch, who became Archbishop of Crete, and died 740) on the Holy Cross

The Cross is called the glory of Christ, and his exaltation.

It is the chalice for which he longed, the consummation of his sufferings on our behalf.

It is the glory of Christ - listen to his words: Now is the Son Man glorified, and God is glorified in him, and God will glorify him at once.

And again: Glorify me, Father, with the glory which I had with you before the world was made. And

again: Father, glorify your name.

So there came a voice from the heavens: I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again. By this he means the glory which Christ received on the Cross.

The Cross is also Christ's exaltation. Listen again to his own words: When I am lifted up, I will draw all men to myself.

You see then that the Cross is the glory and the exaltation of Christ.
