Great Britain & Ireland to have their own Bishop!

The Holy Synod of the Church of Antioch met in October and decided among other things that we in these islands are to have an Antiochian Bishop to ourselves.

First, and very soon, we shall have what they call a *Patriarchal Vicar Bishop*. This means an assistant Bishop who is responsible only to His Beatitude the Patriarch.

Then, as early as next summer, the Holy Synod will elect a Metropolitan Bishop for us—and one can only think that the Vicar Bishop himself will be elected Metropolitan if the scheme has till then been a success.

This marvellous news reached us pretty well as soon as decided, and has now been announced in the official Communiqué.

It is part of a grand scheme for the whole of the Patriarchate's work in Europe, and must be the direct result of our Patriarch's experience in Europe—he was our beloved Archbishop in Europe for four years until his election as Patriarch last December.

Instead of one Archbishop trying to cover the whole continent, we are also to have an Archbishop for Germany and Central Europe, an Archbishop for France and Western and Southern Europe, and a Patriarchal Vicar Bishop for Sweden and Scandinavia (presumably the latter being a semi-permanent appointment).

The Archbishops have been named for Germany - Isaak - and for France Ignatius, who is there already.

We in Britain and Ireland are of course on tenterhooks for our Bishop to be named.

Perhaps by the time you read this we shall know who it will be. We are told it will be soon!

All this is a wonderful development. The clergy of the Deanery had made it clear that we felt we needed a Bishop for our oversight.

Now we have a new Diocese with a Bishop who will shortly (all being well) be 'bumped up' to Metropolitan.

It is a magnificent answer to our prayers.

I think it may well be

the opening of a new chapter not only in the history of the Antiochian Church, but also of the whole Orthodox Church in the country.

As long as the new Bishop understands British ways - our thought-patterns, our culture - he will have an influence not only on our own Archdiocese but also on the Orthodox Church throughout these islands—and possibly even on society around us.

Pray, then, for our new Bishop/Metropolitan, whoever he may be.

As soon as he is consecrated and starts his work, his *episcopé* (his 'bishoply' oversight), there will surely be a lot of activity in the Church.

There will be ordinations pretty quickly, one hopes. There will surely be Bishop's Visits to *all* our parishes and missions - two of our parishes in Britain have *never* been visited by a Bishop in 18 years.

There will be pastoring and training of the clergy themselves. There will be central and regional events drawing parishes and Priests out of isolation.

There will be initiatives in training the laity, and encouraging them to take a full part in the running of their parishes.


There will be the setting up of an effective Archdiocesan administration - not too bureaucratic, one hopes.

This must be a great development. We in Britain have sometimes felt we had no Bishop at all. Even under dear Archbishop John, recently with three assistant Bishops, the Bishop has been physically distant and stretched in many directions.

Now we shall indeed have a Pastor of our own, one who represents Christ to us, who is a true Father to his flock. Not just in name but in deed.

Entry of the Mother of God

This beautiful feast on 21 November has the child Mary being given over into the hands of the High Priest Zacharias in the Temple of Jerusalem. There she will be looked after, and trained in the service of God. She runs forward from her parents Saints Joachim and Anna conscious only of her new life. She will remain in the Temple throughout her childhood, learning the things of God, 'absorbing' faith. Then she will be fit and ready to herself become the Ark of God, the one who contains in her own womb the living God, Christ our Saviour.

ST EDMUND KING AND MARTYR

Much loved by many English people (feast 20 Nov), he is said to have been England's patron saint before St George. He lived in the ninth century, and was king of East Anglia, roughly the counties of Norfolk and Suffolk (there were then several kingdoms in England). He was crowned at Hunstanton on the north Norfolk coast and again on the southern border at Bures, near Colchester.

As a king it was his duty to defend his people and when the Danes invaded his territory he defended it. Defeated at Thetford in Norfolk in 870, he hid under a bridge at Hoxne, not far from Norwich, but was betrayed by young lovers who noticed him. The Danes would have spared him, had he renounced his faith, but as a very devout follower of Christ he refused. They shot arrows at him and then beheaded him. Miraculously, a wolf guarded his head.

He was buried at Bury St Edmunds in Suffolk, but is now in Arundel RC Cathedral in Sussex. *St Edmund, pray to God for us.*

Here and There

THE NATIVITY FAST begins on 15 November, as it always does. It is not as 'fierce' a fast as the Lent fast. Everyday we avoid meat and dairy products (milk, cheese, etc). We also avoid fish on weekdays, but on Saturdays and Sundays we may have fish, wine, and oil, except on the last weekend before the Nativity, when only wine and oil are allowed.

ANOTHER THEFT FROM ST HELEN'S: Our Holy Water Vat - the vessel containing Holy Water, with a tap for people to take some home - has been stolen. Coming so soon after the theft of the Holy Relic and of the Chalices etc, this has been a little dispiriting. The first items have been found and returned, as we reported in last month's Newsletter.

CCTV: In the hope of deterring would-be thieves, the Parish Council is considering the installation of an internal television system.

A Word from the Fathers: St Cyril of Jerusalem (+ 386) on the Creed

The faith which the Church hands down to you has all the authority of the Scriptures behind it. This is the faith, and none other, which you must learn to proclaim and in which you must persevere....

Keep this faith ever by your side to help you on your way, and close your ears and have nothing to do with any other....

To begin with, simply take the words as they stand at their face value, put your faith in them and commit them to memory. Later, as opportunity offers, you can take the propositions one by one and study them as truths of the sacred Scriptures. This summary of our faith is not a merely human composition, but the more striking sayings of the Scriptures have been assembled together to form one comprehensive statement. And as a small mustard seed carries within itself the

potential of large branches, so the words of our creed are pregnant with the whole content of our religion as it is expressed in both the Old and the New Testaments.

Pay attention then, brethren, to the truths of faith now being handed down to you, and write them deep in your hearts. Keep a careful watch, and be on your guard against foes and heretics intent on perverting your faith and plundering it. You must as it were deposit this gift of faith in the bank for safe-keeping and God will demand of you an account of your investment....

You have been entrusted with immortal treasure, and the Lord will require an account of it from you at the time of his appearing, and this will be made manifest at the proper time by the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords....
