
+ Holy Orthodoxy: a glorious Faith, ever-old, ever-new! +



In the land of St Patrick

I reland is a land rich in beauty, in its Celtic culture, in its Orthodox saints. I have known that, I suppose, all my life. Now I have experienced just a little of it.

I was there on Church business at the end of September, privileged to represent the world-wide Church of Antioch in Orthodox discussions with the world-wide Anglican Communion.

Last year the Dialogues produced a report, *In the Image and Likeness of God*, called *The Buffalo Statement*. It has not taken the world by storm, but I do believe it to be a very good account of the Christian belief that you and I are made in God's image, and that if we have lost our *likeness* to God, we are still essentially in his *image*. [This nicely-produced and readable report is available on the Church Bookstall at £5.00.]

This year we have begun on the work of spelling that belief out in practice, considering together tremendous but delicate subjects: what should be the Christian attitude to moral problems like bioethics - gender manipulation, organ transplants, abortion, 'three-parent' children, etc, etc.

These discussions are very important in everyday life, and everyone needs help to think about them. Societies and their authorities need help in making laws about them. Clergy need help in teaching their faithful, The faithful need help in casting their votes in elections. Scientists need help in the right way to direct their extraordinary skills.

So I believe this work is worthwhile. We do not think our work is leading to any form of union with the Anglicans. But for two communions of Christians together to think through such problems can be a help to them and to world society.

The discussions this year took place in **Armagh**. This small city in Northern Ireland is very close to the border. Both the Anglican Archbishop Richard (our host) and the Catholic Archbishop Eamon have their cathedrals there, for it is where St Patrick made his base for the evangelisation of the island in the fifth century, and they are his successors as Primates. The Anglican cathedral is the ancient one of course, where St Patrick's cathedral was, on a very steep hill in the centre of the city. The fine 19th-century RC one is close by on another hill-top.

The two Archbishops are good friends, the RC one coming to greet us when we opened our proceedings. Anglicans are thought of as Protestants, and the two Archbishops are considered the respective leaders of the two sides. They feel a responsibility in promoting peace between the two groups.

There is continuing need for reconciliation, but it was encouraging to see also that the ordinary people want not only justice for their own community but also peace between them.


On all sides reconciliation is widely seen as to be found in the great Apostle of Ireland, St Patrick himself. He of course is an Orthodox saint as much as a Catholic or Protestant one, living well back in the period of a united Christendom, East and West.

The Anglicans gave generous hospitality throughout our stay. This included a lovely coach tour around the eastern sea-coast of

County Down, "where the [magnificent] Mountains of Mourne sweep down to the sea".

There we made a pilgrimage to the isolated church at **Saul** where St Patrick first built a church and where he returned to die, and to **Downpatrick** cathedral,

where he was buried, and the St Patrick's Centre there which gives a lot of information and is a place of unity.

At his burial place Archbishop Richard blessed and presented us each with a small reproduction of the fine 10th-century High Cross of Monasterboice.

I must also confess that they gave us a magnificent dinner that evening at what must be the grandest hotel in the district, the Victorian Slieve Donard, facing the highest mountain (slieve) in Northern Ireland, across the sea-lough.

I was also able privately, on my first time in the "Emerald Isle", to visit the "fair city" of **Dublin**, capital of the Republic of Ireland, to see the wonderful Book of Kells - a beautiful and fine copy of the Holy Gospels probably copied about the year 800 in the Monastery of Iona, a real Irish treasure.

For my family history, I was able complete my visit to Dublin by visiting the Barracks where two of my great-great-great-grand-fathers probably served during the Napoleonic wars, and the Kilmainham Royal Hospital, where one was pensioned off.

And in **Belfast**, capital of Northern Ireland, I visited the fine Parliament Buildings at Stormont, where (years before its building,, on the farm of cousins) my grandparents had their honeymoon.

Altogether I had a really wonderful time in Ireland, discussing very important subjects, and praying in places that are holy indeed for every Orthodox.

St Patrick, pray to God for Ireland, for us and all divided Christians. God bless you all. Father Alexander

Bath Orthodox Parish seeks help to fund a new church

The Bath Orthodox parish of St John of Kronstadt was founded by my dear friend Father Yves Dubois in 1981, I think, and though he is still around, the Parish Priest now is Father Seraphim Johnson. Over the years the parish has worshipped in a chapel in Fr Yves' house and in local churches they have been able to rent.

Now they have issued an appeal for funds to buy Holy Trinity Church. Queen Square, in the centre of the city.

As many will know, Bath is a magnificent World Heritage site. I had the privilege to be the Anglican Rector of Holy Trinity from 1978 to 1989, and we were very happy there. When we arrived we had just been married, and our three children were born in Bath.

Outside, it must be admitted, the building is not particularly beautiful, but inside it is very lovely indeed. It would make a splendid temple for Orthodox worship.

I know that as a fact, since the Orthodox parish used to borrow it for 'big' services. Both His Eminence Metropolitan Kallistos and His Eminence the late Metropolitan Antony preached or officiated there at various times. It is in a prominent position and would be a great advertisement for Holy Orthodoxy to the residents and many visitors.

The Orthodox parish was very dear to us when we were in Bath. The Haig family were very much part of its outer circle: we and our children were always welcome there. Later on

ST JAMES THE LORD'S BROTHER was actually either Christ's step-brother or a cousin. He is venerated as the first Bishop of Jerusalem, and is mentioned in the New Testament. He himself was an Apostle but not one of the Twelve. He wrote the Epistle or Letter of St James, and presided at the first Council of the Church in Jerusalem, ruling the Church there for many years. He died a martyr's death, being thrown from the "pinnacle" of the Temple. He was clearly a wonderful and caring pastor of his flock, and was nick-named "James the Just". (Feast: 23 October)
