

SORRY! NO SERVICES AT ST HELEN'S
UNTIL WE RECEIVE PERMISSION

You are encouraged to read the prayers of the Church on your own if you can manage that, or to pray more prayers from your own prayer book, such as an Akathist or a Canon or Hours.

Or you can watch services on television or internet in English or in your own language.

I am praying for all members of the community of our church and for all citizens of Colchester and district, and for all the world in this sad and difficult time. May God have mercy on us and save our souls.

Still no news about actually taking over St Martin's - but we hope it may happen very soon!

Part of the reason is that if our churches are given permission to reopen soon, they are pretty certain to demand that there be social isolation—i.e. that people not in the same domestic household will have to stand at least two metres apart.

In St Helen's it will mean (because it is so small) that few people can be admitted to worship at the same time. But in St Martin's (so much larger) we would be able to accommodate many more at the same time.

Let's pray that good sense and helpfulness may apply. Pray about it, please, and watch out for news.

Prayer counts for a lot. They were all praying together in the Upper Room at the time of Pentecost - around Mary and the other women, it tells us - when the Holy Spirit came down on the Apostles and their companions - in power and glory.

They were utterly changed. Previously they had been timid and shy and afraid. Now they became strong in the Lord and in the power of his might. God took hold of them and filled them with himself.

The result was that their mission to the people gathered in Jerusalem was transformed. They had been fishers of fish. Now they became *fishers of men*.

That is what we need now—for God to come and fill us, weak and pathetic sinners, with his divine life so that we may serve him in this town and borough, effectively to preach his word to people in their needs and the problems of their lives, so that they may be transformed also.

Use that prayer to the Holy Spirit which we know so well because it is printed in our prayer books for use very often particularly before the *Holy God (Trisagion)* prayers. It is one of the very few prayers to the Third Person of God in the liturgical life of the Church. It is addressed to *the life-giving, life-creating, Spirit of God*: I invite you to say it every day in the context of your prayers for obtaining St Martin's:

O heavenly King, Comforter, Spirit of Truth, who art everywhere present and fillest all things, Treasury of blessings, and Giver of life, come and abide in us, and cleanse us from every impurity, and save our souls, O Good One.



Here and There

FATHER JOHN TURNER was an Anglican priest who lived many years of retirement at Frinton, and was a good friend of this parish. Sadly he died on 1 May 2020 aged 95. I discovered only recently that in his youth during World War II he had been a decoder in the Japanese department at Bletchley Park. He was a parish priest here at Weeley, but at heart he was a scholar, and was sub-warden for some years at St Deiniol's Library in north Wales, the celebrated residential library founded by William Gladstone. He had a deep knowledge of Orthodoxy and particularly of St Simon the New Theologian, whose works he translated into English, for which he was awarded a PhD. We knew him and his lovely wife Jean as keen long-standing fellow-members of the Fellowship of SS Alban and Sergius. They seem never to have been tempted to become Orthodox, but both were also enthusiastic members of the local branch in Colchester, he as chairman. Jean died a few years ago: he remained very active until quite recently. Their son Francis lives in Japan, but thankfully was here with his father when he died. The funeral has taken place but there will be a memorial service, probably at Kirby-le-Soken where he assisted, after the pandemic has died down. We shall miss him. Memory eternal!

THE APOSTLES FAST always finishes on 28 June, the day before SS Peter and Paul, but starts on the day following All Saints Day. All Saints is the Sunday after Pentecost, so the Fast always starts on a Monday, this year on 15 June. It therefore varies in length each year. It is the least strict of the fasts of the year. Consult your Diocesan calendar for the details.



Traditionally both St Peter and St Paul were martyred in Rome on 29 June but in different years, Peter by upside-down crucifixion in AD 64 and

Paul by beheading in AD 65, though the actual years and other historical points are disputed. They were the "chiefs" of the Apostles and therefore of the Christian Church, Peter from the beginning, Paul (who did not know Christ in the flesh, except in his vision outside Damascus) only from later on. Peter and Paul were 'natural' leaders, but also greatly gifted by the Holy Spirit in the life and affairs of the Church. Though not afraid to dispute points in the Gospel of Christ, they were one in mind and heart. Both are venerated as joint founders not only of the Church in Rome, as is well known, but also of the Church in Antioch, which is much less known.

A Word from the Fathers: St Augustine of Hippo (+430)

This day has been consecrated for us by the martyrdom of the blessed apostles Peter and Paul. It is not some obscure martyrs we are talking about. "Their sound has gone out into all the earth, and their words to the ends of the world". These martyrs had seen what they proclaimed, they pursued justice by confessing the truth, by dying for the truth.

The blessed Peter, the first of the Apostles, the ardent lover of Christ, who was found worthy to hear, "And I say to you, that you are Peter". He himself, you see, had just said, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God."

Christ said to him, "And I say to you that you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church." Upon this rock I will build the faith you have just confessed. Upon your words, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God," I will build my Church; because you are Peter.

Peter comes from *petra*, meaning a rock, Peter, "Rocky", from "rock"; not "rock" from "Rocky". Peter comes from the word for a rock in exactly the same way as the name Christian comes from Christ.

Before his passion the Lord Jesus, as you know, chose those disciples of his whom he called apostles. Among these it was only Peter who

almost everywhere was given the privilege of representing the whole Church. It was in the person of the whole Church, which he alone represented, that he was privileged to hear, "To you will I give the keys of the kingdom of heaven."

After all, it is not just one man that received these keys, but the Church in its unity. So this is the reason for Peter's acknowledged pre-eminence, that he stood for the Church's universality and unity, when he was told, "To you I am entrusting," what has in fact been entrusted to all.

To show you that it is the Church which has received the keys of the kingdom of heaven, listen to what the Lord says in another place to all his apostles: "Receive the Holy Spirit; and immediately afterwards, Whose sins you forgive, they will be forgiven them; whose sins you retain, they will be retained"

There is one day for the passion of two apostles. But these two also were as one; although they suffered on different days, they were as one. Peter went first, Paul followed.

We are celebrating a feast day, consecrated for us by the blood of the apostles. Let us love their faith, their lives, their labours, their sufferings, their confession of faith, their preaching....
